## Beeman, Brown Join County Team

CUMBERLAND COUNTY welcomes two new Department Heads, who bring a wealth of knowledge and experience with them.

**RANDY BEEMAN** is the new Emergency Services Director. Former Emergency Services Director Kenny Currie retired April 1 after 28 years with the county.

Beeman is a 1980 graduate of East Carolina University and holds a bachelor's degree in business administration. He brings to Cumberland County Emergency Services more than 30 years experience in local government and the private sector. He was the Hope Mills town manager from May 2007 until January 2012. Prior to that, he was the town manager in River Bend for three years and the Pamlico County Manager for five years. He was the Pamlico County Tax Administrator for 15 years and has worked as an accountant and auditor in the private sector.

As a municipal and county manager in the coastal region, he developed emergency response plans and directed emergency evacuation routes during storm events and recovery operations.

In addition to his managerial experience, Beeman has 30 years of service as a volunteer emergency responder in Pamlico County.

**JEFFERY BROWN** is the new Director of Engineering and Infrastructure. He replaces former County Engineer Robert Stanger who retired May 1 after 30 years with the county.

Brown's professional experience includes eight years with the City of Fayetteville, where he worked his way up from Engineer II, to City Engineer, and then the Engineering and Infrastructure Director. Prior to joining the city's engineering department, he spent five years with the NC Department of Environment and Natural Resources as an environmental engineer.

Brown graduated from Midway High School in Dunn. He is a 1997 graduate of NC State University, where he earned a bachelor's of science degree in biological and agricultural engineering.



# Project Homeless Connect

## Seeks Donations, Volunteers for May 17 Event



**P**ROJECT HOMELESS CONNECT WILL BE HELD ON MAY 17 at the Smith Recreation Center from 7:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. The annual event is sponsored by the Cumberland County Continuum of Care on Homelessness and is designed to give the homeless in Fayetteville and Cumberland County access to agencies and services that can help make a difference in their lives. Several county departments are participating in the one-day event, and county employees have the chance to bring in items the week of May 7-11 to be distributed to the homeless in our community.

## DSS Employees Give Back

**D**EPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES EMPLOYEES contributed \$1,090 to the Fayetteville Area Operation Inasmuch as part of their National County Government Month celebration in April. The staff also donated coffee, creamer, sugar, pancake mixes, hot chocolate, foot powder, petroleum jelly, toiletries and bug spray to the non-profit organization that works with the homeless. DSS Director Brenda Jackson and a group of staff presented the gifts to Sue Byrd, executive director, on April 12.



The following items are needed: Flip-flops; petroleum jelly; white socks; soft drinks; bug repellent; foot powder; bus passes; lip balm; sleeping bags; wet wipes; backpacks; ponchos; gallon-size plastic zip bags; toilet paper; underwear-male/female; hand sanitizer (small); and sunscreen.

You will recognize the green plastic collection boxes as the ones we use in the winter for our Annual Holiday Food Drive. Collection points in the Courthouse will be on the lower level at the building's rear entrances. The collection boxes will be picked up on Friday, May 11.

"Orchestrating this event takes great effort, and we are thankful for the various partners from the public, private and non-profit sectors who are coming together for this one-stop event to reach the homeless," said Cumberland County Community Development Director Thanena Wilson.

"It is just one small part of a much greater goal -- to end homelessness in our community," she said.

This Multi-Modal Congestion Management Plan will be guided by local input from citizens and municipal leaders to understand what is needed in terms of future growth planning and how to provide safe travels for vehicles, pedestrian and bicycles.

## The Multi-Modal Congestion Plan will:


- Establish a regional vision for the study area;
- Address land use suitability needs;
- Identify existing travel patterns and transportation network deficiencies;
- Identify bicycling, pedestrian, and transit alternatives to prevent automobile travel and congestion;
- Identify short-term and long-term improvements for roadways and intersection projects.

Area citizens are encouraged to get involved and provide leaders with input in how the roadway networks are performing currently and what can be done in the future to provide safe and efficient travels. ## Fayetteville Beautiful Holds Recycling Event

**F**AYETTEVILLE BEAUTIFUL is partnering with the City of Fayetteville and Sustainable Sandhills to host an electronic waste (e-waste) drive and compost bin and rain barrel sale on Saturday, May 19 at Westwood Shopping Center from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. Accepted items include televisions, computers and monitors, computer peripherals, keyboards, printers, scanners, cables, telephones, cellular phones, video games and game systems-basically, anything that operates on batteries or has a plug, with the exception of white goods (stoves, refrigerators, air conditioners, washer/dryer,

etc.), radioactive material, lamps, batteries and CRT televisions larger than 27 inches.

Compost bins and rain barrels will be on sale while supplies last. The compost bins allow residents to easily compost food scraps and turn them into a useful soil amendment. Rain barrels help reduce the expense of outdoor watering by harvesting and storing rain water to be used for watering flowers or shrubs. Paper shredding will also be available between the hours of 10 a.m.-1 p.m.


Ward, who was born in the Bronx and raised in Manhattan, has been writing since age 10. She hopes her poetry will reach into readers' souls and help them examine their lives.


McNeill graduated from N.C. State University with a degree in Biological and Agricultural Engineering. He is a retired N.C.

# 5 Guidelines for Healthy Foods and Beverages at Meetings, Gatherings and Events

AS COUNTY EMPLOYEES we all at some point and time host a training or meeting where food is served. It could be a simple snack to serving lunch or dinner. Consider providing lower fat, lower-calorie foods and drinks that may give attendees the energy boost they may need. Cumberland County Cooperative Extension encourages employees to use the following Eat Smart Move More North Carolina guidelines when providing food and drinks during meetings.

## Guideline 1: Offer healthy food choices at breakfasts, lunches, dinners, potluck and receptions

- Fruit and vegetables are low in calories and high in vitamins, minerals and fiber
- Offer lower calorie beverages like water, low-fat milk, and unsweetened teas
- Offer baked, roasted or grilled meats and fish, served with vegetables prepared without added fat

## Guideline 2 : Offer only healthy foods at mid-morning or mid-afternoon meeting breaks

- Offer only fruits and vegetables and/or other healthy foods
- Offer a physical activity break instead. Turn on some music and get people to dance and move around

## Guideline 3: Identify and promote healthier food and beverages

Healthy food and beverage options for meetings and events can be purchased in many places: restaurants, grocery stores, farmer's markets, caterers, just to name a few.

## Guideline 4: Keep food safe to eat

- Wash hands and surfaces often
- Separate raw, cooked, and ready-to-eat foods while shopping, preparing, and storing
- Cook and chill foods to a safe temperature; and serve foods safely

## Guideline 5: Lead by example

When group leaders role-model healthy eating and physical activity, it makes a powerful statement. Show your members or employees that you are concerned about their health and well being. Challenge them to lead by example too. Buy healthy foods when you dine out. Prepare and eat healthy meals at home. Do not forget to build physical activity into your events as well. Encourage physical activity in your organization and “walk the talk” yourself.



## Suggestions for Foods and Beverages

### Beverages

- Ice Water
- Bottled spring or sparkling water – regular or flavored, with no added sugar
- 100% fruit or vegetable juices – avoid large- size bottles
- Skim or 1% milk (regular or lactose-free)
- Coffee – regular and decaffeinated
- Tea – regular and herb teas – hot or cold; unsweetened
- Soy beverage

### Snacks

- Fresh fruit – cut up and offered with low-fat yogurt dip
- Raw vegetables – cut up and offered with fat-free or low-fat dressing or salsa dip
- Pretzels – served with mustard dip.
- Tortilla chips – baked and offered with salsa dip
- Popcorn – lower-fat (5g fat or less/serving)

### Breakfast Meetings

- Fresh fruit
- Yogurt – flavored non-fat or fat-free
- Bagels – 3 ½ inch diameter or less; serve with low-fat cream cheese, jam or jelly
- Muffins – small or mini (5g fat or less/muffin)
- Fruit bread (5g fat or less/1oz slice)
- Granola bars – low-fat (5g fat or less/bar)

### Catered Lunches and Dinners

- Select an entrée with no more than 12 to 15 grams fat
- Always offer a vegetarian entrée
- Avoid fried foods or cream sauces
- Include fresh fruit
- Include at least one vegetable – fresh or cooked, with no butter or cream sauces
- Serve salads with dressing on the side – offer at least one low-fat or fat-free dressing
- Include whole-grain breads
- Choose lower-fat/lower calorie desserts: cut up fresh fruit with low-fat yogurt dip; low-fat ice cream or frozen yogurt; sherbet or sorbet; angel food cake with fruit topping
